My Dear Mother: -

I experienced no ordinary gratification in the reception of your affectionate letter by the hand of Cousin Do. As I have written to father and Martha very particularly in relation to my situation, and as I am driven for time, you will excuse me for not writing so much at length as I otherwise should. In reply to your inquiry how I am on it for shirts, &c. I will say that I think I shall want another pair, like the last I had, before long. I shall also want a pair of cotton drawers this summer. I do not like the idea of wearing flannel next my skin - I should like also a cotton undershirt. But I sincerely pray you will not undertake to make them for me, unless you are smarter than you are now. If you should, I shall feel condemned for mentioning that I wanted them.

I cannot believe you will press any objection to my going South next winter. I feel that it is the best thing I can possibly do. I have pretty much made up my mind to go that way, or to the far west, bearing cir-
