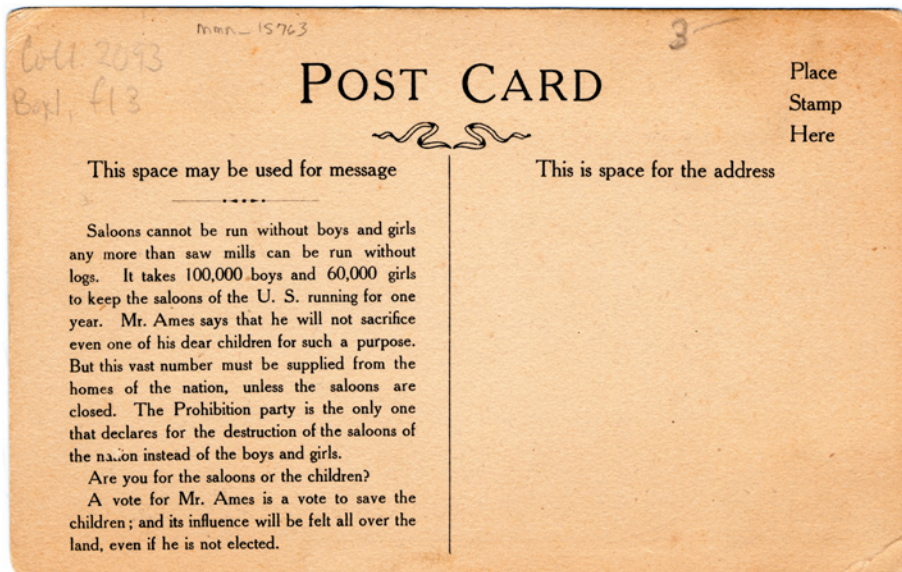




James H. Ames, Prohibition Nominee for Governor of Maine, and family. Over.
