My dear Madam



I shall try to send you some thing – though sick of all such self indul gences. You did not send me a proof — & the consequence is — downright murder, not only of the music & rhythm, but of the thought. "While the strong falter" — has been printed "While the living falter" —

My wife joins me in kind wishes for yr happiness, & health & thanks you for [?] of his growth &c. Your well
