Gentlemen, There is an application before  
 the Legislature for the incorporation of  
 a new town to be composed of a  
 part of this and the neighboring towns  
 of Sebago Otisfield, Harison and Raymond. We hope that  
 the subject will be referred to the next Legislature, but if  
 the petition should be granted and a new town in-  
 corporated, we feel extremely solicitous in regard to its clas-  
 sification for Representatives. It is well known to you  
 all that we have fought a hard fight in this town  
 and it has been not without the most strenuous exertions  
 and continued effort that we have obtained a Democrat-  
 ic Majority. If said new town is classed with Bridgton  
 in the choice of Representatives, we are down for eight  
 years to come, as a majority of the new town are  
 of the opposition and will undoubtedly be sufficient  
 to more than balance the majority which we now  
 have in this town. The town of Bridgton by the last  
 census contains 1541 Inhabitants and probably about  
 the 41 are taken off by the new town, so that we still  
 have 1500 exclusive of the increase which has been con-  
 siderable since 1820. The new town will probably contain  
 about 400. The town of Danville in this county by the  
 last census has about 1100 Inhabitants. So that it will  
 be seen that if the new town should be put with  
 Danville we should be as large as the class and

if the new town should be classed with Bridgton  
the class would contain 1900 Inhabitants while  
Danville would continue to send a Representative  
with only her 1100. We are aware that it may  
be objected that the town of Danville and the new  
town do not join each other, but it is a fact that  
towns not contiguous to each other were classed  
together by the last apportionment Resolve. We  
feel very anxious on this subject and hope that  
we shall not be obliged to take the new town  
if it can possibly be avoided. It would be  
considered a great victory by our powerful oppo-  
nents in this town if such should be the result  
and we confidently hope that you will do  
all you can consistently with your duty to avert  
the calamity from us. We are Gentlemen very  
respectfully, your obedient Servants.
