

Baldwin Dec, 29th, 1855.

My Dear Brother,

Your kind letter of the 28th, was duly and gratefully received, most sincerely do I thank you and your good wife, for your kind wishes and invitations, to come to you, and I verily expected, ere this to have, been with you, but events beyond my control, have prevented, first, I was disappointed, in regard to Lydia Janes not going to Limerick, then a severe cold, acquired, in going out to procure, a boarding place for her, has for the two last weeks, kept me close, and almost incapacitated me for making any exertion. I have procured board for her with her Cousin, Mrs Noble, formerly Maria Burnel, at West Baldwin, where she will attend the district school, and hope to be with you, in the course of two weeks. The season thus far has been very favourable, for lone females, last night we had about 8 inches of snow the most that has fallen at one time this winter, and as I have disposed of all my animals, and Charles has fixed me so comfortably, for winter, that I need not "fear the snow even though my Household, be not clothed in scarlet" and my good friend, and kind Neighbour Mr Boothby comes every day, or sends his Son, to see that I want for nothing, but as I have made no provision for housekeeping, this winter, I wish to leave as soon as I feel well enough to ride as far as Gorham.
