



I John Dunlop of lawful age, do testify and say, that I have lived in the Town of Brunswick upwards of forty years, and in early life spent many of those years in hunting up and down the Androscoggin River and am well acquainted with all the falls on sd river, as well as every other part thereof as far up as what is now called pennicook, and the falls on or near so. Pennicook are the largest upon the whole river. and are divided into three Pitches, the uppermost of which is the largest I ever saw: which falls are called the great Androscoggin falls. am also fully acquainted with all the Indian settlements on sd river; of which Rockomico— point, so called, is the largest and appeared to be much the oldest. In passing up and down sd river, at a place called the ten- mile-falls, I have seen at the head of sd falls on the easterly side of the river, a place which appeared to be the settlement of some English planter where a large cellar was dug, and remained still to be seen, which I never saw in any Indian settlement, which appears to be very ancient.
