was born on July 4, 1829, in Finsterwalde, a city thirty miles north of Dresden.

Inheriting a musical nature from father and grandfather—both professional musicians—at three years of age he began the study of music, and at eight made his first bow to an audience playing Weber's Polonaise in Eb Minor.

Leaving Finsterwalde at the age of fourteen, he studied assiduously in Dresden for over five years under the renowned teacher of composition, Julius Otto, at the same time becoming proficient as a player on the violin, flute, horn and trombone.

Determining to try his fortune in America, in company with twenty young German musicians, the Saxonia Bandowas s formed, and the organization arrived in New York, November, 1848. After praying engagements in Philadelepina Novew with and Boston, the members—later in the season—disbanded.

At this time Mr. Kotzschmar was just twenty, and had decided to settle in Boston, when a friend, unable to keep his engagement with the Portland Theater Orchestra, asked him, as an accommodation, to fill his place. He came, expecting to remain but a few days, but was so attracted by the beauties of the "Forest City" that Portland has been his home for fifty years. Almost immediately he began teaching the piano, and with such success that his reputation grew with each year, while hundreds of pupils owe their love of music to his inspiring guidance. For 47 years he was organist of the First Parish; for 30 years conductor of the Portland Haydn Association. He is known all over the United States as a composer of Church music, while his famous "Te Deum in F" is also sung in Europe.
