Starting this week we are printing Momories of The Sands by Ann Merriam of Prospect Harbor who, as Ann Van Mess, spont practically all of her childhood and the years since during the summer at Prospect Harbor. The Sands is two things: a comminity of three houses owned by Richard and Warron Shaw, David Mann and Bessie Ray and a hard flat sand boach 500 feet across ( owned by the above ) bounded on the east by Cranberry Point and on the west by Lighthouse Point, Mrs. Herriam begins:

(David Mann's daughter and son-in-law) house once stood a small storey and a half It had a vine form house. covered arbor over the front door and it was painted yellow. I have seen a photograph of it but cannot romember it mysolf. My momorios bogin after it burned.

In the interim between the fire and the building of the present house, Captain and Mrs. George Allon lived in what is now the Rascos! shed. I recollect calling thoro when a child and being dolighted with the small surroundings. It seemed like a playhouse, This must have been about the turn of the century. How long they lived there before beginning the large house. I can't say. I romombor well somowhat later going with the Captain to somo quarry ( oast of The Sands, san side of the Corea "On the site of the Rascos' Road) to drag granito for the foundations, and later still climbing up the stagings to bog the corportors to let me drive a few nails. When finished the house was painted yollow, probably in momory of the old homestend, and remainod that color until it was bought by Mrs. Rasco's father. David Many". (To be contid)

The Milroy Poultry Farm in Corrishvillo, owned by Milton Torray and operated by him, his wife Vorn, assisted by their granddaughters man. is in its 7th your.

The Torroys buy 15,000 of those funiliar blue and gray ogg boxes every year. The "Egg Room" is usually lined with high piles of full boxos which have been olassifind by the electric Egometic Orndor - the jumbo and extra large going into the same compartment and the following having their own separate Sullivan. The surplus go to compartments: large, medium, small and poe woo.

The Torreys buy chickens two and three times a year. Last February they bought 1000. Their present layers numbering 1504 give them between 950 and 1000 eggs a

dny.

Lilton's schodulo is rather crowded. The first thing in the merning he opens the houses, foods the hons and clorns their water dishes. This takes about 2 hours. Then he grades and packs the oggs taken the day before which have had a chance to cool over night. At 11 AM

and again at 2 PM he collects: small: past and present. No.6 and at 4 PM he feeds and rechecks water dishes.

Edith Tracy . . . Editor COOKS CORNER UPSIDE DOWN HAM LOAF From Bernice Merchant, Gouldsboro One 9 oz can pineapple tid-

bits 1/4 cup brown sugar

1 lb ground ham, shoulder 1 cup dried bread crumbs 1/2 cup milk 1/8 tsp ground cloves l egg, slightly beaten

Drain pineapple and arrange in bottom of loaf pan. 8 X 3. Combine brown sugar and cloves. Sprinkle over pineapple. Combine ham and becf with crumbs, milk and egg and mix well. Put into pan on pineapple mixture. Bake uncovered on top rack about 1 1/2 hours, at 350. Turn out on serving plater.

#### APHILION

"Many people think that summers are hot because the earth is nonrost to the sun at this soason. For us in the northern hemisphere nothing could be farther from the truth for the simple reason that actually to-morrow is the day on which the earth is farthost from the sun. This may be a blessing if the day is the traditional Fourth of July.

but perhaps a little extra heat might be welcome should we have more of this backward season.

On the other hand, the difforence in distance between being farthest from the sun at aphelion, and nearest at poriholiom, is not onough to 1 1b hamburg (both meats raw be noticed ordinarily, as it amounts to only slightly 3 porcent, which means less than 6 1/2 percent difference in the strength of the sun's rays. However, mariners must romember that in summer the sun appears just a little smaller, because of the greator distance, by enough to throw them off position as much as a mile. Summer time is also more favorable for secing total eclipses of the sun, because they are somewhat more frequent and last a little longer than in Wintor." C.F.M.

Ann Merrica of Prospect

Sands at the turn of the
century told us last week
that Captain and Mrs. George
Allen lived in the center
house and new continues with
her "Memories": "Captain
and Mrs. Allen had no chil dren. The Captain was a confaring man, but at the request of his wife gave up
the sea.

The large house was built for summer boarders and for a few years was reasonably well patronized. But Mrs. Allen was not strong and the

Captain not goared to farming, so that in the end the big house proved an expensive white clophant.

At this time the Tracy house -- now the Shaws' -- had no porch across the hitchen. On the Resce side was a low unpainted shed. The present addition was built by Mr. Tracy after his wife "Aunt Handy" began taking summer bearders.

From the from of the main house to the rend ran a low white fence enclosing a little Inwn and flower garden. The entranco was through the blanched jaw bone of a whale, in fact, there were a number of old whole benus and treptenl pholis around the premises which I unjoyed playing with. Norr the road, boyend the onclosed garden lay a strawberry bod. The first time I saw Aunt Phody - a tall spare woman uchring a groy on Hee sun bonnot, who was out there picking strawborrics."

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

We both learned to row and nwim in this pool. Parhaps the greatest change is the number of people who new frequent the place. All summor long we could play Robinson Crusou to our hoart's contont. ## VENUS AGAIN

"Far outshining anything in the eastern sky before dawn, Verms is again coming into view after passing between us and the sun to become a morning star.

Reversing its program as an evening star, Venus instead of a long crescendo followed by a quick decline after its climax, ascends quickly to greatest brilliancy on July 29th and then gradually fados away, growing dimmer and dimmer until well into the early menths of next year. Then after passing on the far side of the sun it will begin a new cycle.

For a few days around the 29th it will differ from all other colostial bodies for it will not entirely disap-

-bonr with the rising of the sun, for whon the sky is cloudless Venus may still be soon in full daylight, a bright silver star in an nzuro bluo field. It is not often seen for two reasons. In the first place the sky is seldom sufficiently free from clouds. Secondly one must know just where to look. and it is only when the eyo happens to hit the oxact spot that the star appears. The best way is to watch before dawn before all of the stars have faded and note the one that can still be seen after the sun is up". C.F.M.

TWO CRUST LEMON PIE From Rhode Island. (Don't let this recipe fool you, it's delicious.) 3 slices of white broad (if home made, use only 2 slices) 1 cup boiling water 1 cup surar 2 oggs, separated juice and rind (grated) of

one lemon pastry for two crusts

Remove crust from broad and butter heavily. Put into boiling water and cover with the sugar. Lot stand 15 min. or until cocl. Mix with fork until free from lumps and vory smooth, Add 2 well beaton egg yolks, then the lemon juice and rind last. Then add the stiffly boaton whites of eggs. Stir altozether. Pour irte shell and fit top crust loosely as the filling 57011s. Baku 425 for 15 min., then 30 min, until done in moderate even 350 to 375 until crust is golden.

barray of approximately 10.000 stars soon by tho nakod eye would disappear in about 10 years leaving us barron starless skies. Obviously what we call falling, or shooting, stars are not the roal stars leaving their fixed positions and dropping to carth to shine no more.

Actually the bright strenks of light are caused by small particles drifting in space colliding with the earth. They are so tiny that mercly striking the earth's etmosphere causes them to become burning hot and turn to vapor long before they come near hitting us. Thus very few are large enough to last urtil they reach the ground, de can be very than'cful for this air cushion which protects us from this bombardment, for it is ostimated that about 80,000, 000 strike the atmosphere somewhere each day and some one would surely got hurt though most of thom are no larger than a grain of sand.

#### EDITORIAL

A coastal area of over 600 acres has been designated as a refuge for native and migrating birds by the owners of The Acadian Lodge in Wintor Harbor, Kaine.

Employing a program of planned conservation, in cooperation with the State of Maine Perestry Service, all brood trees have been spared and trails cut along spruce lined bluffs bordering Pronchaen's Bry. Two platonus rising soveral hundred foot provide ideal observation posts for miles around As well as views of the Bay and the Mt. Desert Island rango.

Old-sounw ducks word soon ns late as Juna 23, 16 different species of warblurs have been sighted, the pilarted woodpocker and thu rare three-toud woodpockur and the downy. Observers bovo soon svening grosbank,

rod-oyod vireo, spotted sandpiper and the least sandpiper. Bald eagles, osprey and sea birds can be observed from the sanctuary cliffs.

Special trips are arranged by The Acadian Lodge to visit Inchais Seal Island, the nesting prounds of the Atlantic Puffin, a most adorable and oxotic looking bird. Torns, Arctic Auk, oider and cornerants ero clao soon on the island.

During August at noarby Petit Manan Point Hudsonian curlows may be obsurved as well as

the yellowleg.

From the shore of the sametunry the common loon, the redthronted loon, guillemots, cormorants and the horring and black backed gulls may be seen.

Unusual mosses and wild flowers attract the naturalist to this aron and records are boing compiled of the various variatios to be found.

However, we know Adolbert Leighten came there in 1896. During his service the VIOLA BREWER went ashore on the point with a lead of fish which filled surrounding lobster traps for days.

On May 24, 1924 Tester Loighton, new living in Prospect Marbor became keepor and remained nine years.

PHIL TRACY-BUILDER \* Growing into his father Prod Tracy's trade - carpenter and builder - Phil Tracy of West Gouldsboro learned also to work with or without blue prints. Working with them made building easier on the whole but it did not matter one or another. Oh, if Fred Tracy needed to refer to some authority in building he had his corportor's Bible, a set of 7 books by Pred T. Hodgson. But to roturn to Schoodio, right now vory high in the sky is a bright bluish white star Voga. Just to the oast of it and almost in the conter of the Milky Way, is the constollation of Cygnus, the Swan. To the ancients this . was flying southward with long outstrotched neck, the brightest star hindmost, no it was given the name Denob, meaning "hon's tail". As wo see it. Donob stands at the hond of the symbol of Christianity, an almost perfeet though slightly bent unright composed of four stors flonked by two others nearly equally spaced forming the bar. This Northern cross has a star whore the upright and bar join, a dotail lacking in its southorn counterpart.

"Oh, about a house a year", replied Phil Tracy, carpenter and builder of West Goulds-bore, when we asked him how many houses he had built. Even so, when talking to him, it seemed like more. That, however, does not include the great amount of remodeling he has done throughout his building career.

About 1944 Phil's brother Carlton of Winter Harber joined him, Three generations of Tracys worked on two cettages at the same time on Crowley Island, Corea, the Martin Irelands - they come from Lincoln - and the Robert I. Adriance "Bunkhouse" - he comes from Oreno. There was Fred Tracy, Phil's and Carlton's father, and Phil's son, Allen than about 13 years old who helped by passing lumber.

The year they were building Louise Young's camp at Coron Fred Tracy fell and broke his hip.

It was possibly in 1946 when Phil built Chan Noyes!

Those are still on the building and now, like the building itsolf, are a protty worther d gray. The building 1s 20 X 22 ft., has two stories with a door on the NE corner which foces NM. On the horborside there is a 20 X 28 ft.. whorf. The whole scene with a small fish house on the south side, a work shop on the north side where the brothers have built two 26ft., bents, and the weathered market and wharf is one that has been painted by our artists Sandy and Syd Browne in spring, summer and winter and sent in oil and water color all over the country.

It was about the time that Charlos E. Smith, who had a procory store in Winter Harbor on the site of the school and a fish market on the shore, retired, along 1898, or perhaps shortly before, that the three Pendleton brothers ostablished their fish company. There were Fred and Llowollyn who with their wives lived where Fred now lives - next door to Town Hall- and Andrew who with his wife lived on Sand Cove with her folks the Free Land Bun'cors.

The purpose of the market was to supply the Grindstone Nock Colony with fish. Tho company's first lodger nently kept by Llowollyn was a largo loather bound book which corried monthly accounts with the summer people. Among thom work the accounts of William R. Bliss Nathan Tretter, Bonsal Taylor, Borkoloy Taylor, Goorge D. Dixon, John Moore and so on. Accounts were also carried by folks in the village like David B. Flint, tho late Harry Morrison's father Daniel, Edward J. Hammond who lived at Casa Harina, the

present home of the George
Blancos, Bedford Tracy, the
villago lawyer, and Mrs.
William J. Parker whose husband was captain of the
SCHOODIC and who lived in the
Prod Tracy house, so near,
in fact to the market that
she called for her fish walking down the grassy path over
the hill to the shore.

However, the company made a practice of delivering with horse and team, Llewellyn deing although linwood Coembs and Georg, Gress did more. Orders taken in the merning were deliver dericht away; often a second deliver in a day when oysters on the helf sight were needed.

One or two of the brothers fished in a small boat, houled their own looster traps and carried them on the spot fort Torrey does today. The brothers dug clams; they bought fish from Wast Day and Bunker's Harbor and haddock, in particular, from Jabez Jarick. They speared their own flounder at less Harbor. But the business was so big they had to buy direct from Boston, fish like salmon and systems and mackeral.

SHIME OB, HARVEST MOON.

"Pamed in song, few people know why the harvest moon is so called. It is really nothing special about the moon itself, but a phenomenon which is most marked at the harvest sonson, particularly at northern latitudes. We are familiar with the fact that the moon rises about an hour later each night, 50 min., on the average to be more exact, but this interval will vary considerably for many reasons.

It so happens at the time of the equinox in the autumn the full moon rises more nearly than usual at the same time for several nights in a row, this rising being almost coincident with the setting of the sun. Consequently as the sun goes down the moon rises, and before the days of mechanized harvesting its welcome light afforded the busy farmer longer working hours.

This offect is very prenounced in still more northern latitudes as in Europe, where the tradition undoubtedly had its origin. In the tropies on the other hand there is no variation from this cause, and the time of moonrise is much more regular."

#### EQUINOCTIAL

mwith the approach of the autumnal equinox on Bopt.22 some are weatering whether or when we shall have the equinoctial storm. In this fact or myth? Some say 'Yes' and others 'Nay'. Whatever

it is, it is traditional and many are hard to convince that the passage of the sun across the equator is not the direct cause of violent disturbance of the weather.

Some statistical studies have shown that there is a tondoncy for greater storminess about this season of the year, and it is true that wonther conditions are undergoing a change as the days grow shorter and the average tomporature is dropping. It marks the beginning in this part of the country of months which are distinctly more rainy than the dry months of August and Soptembor, during which what rain fall there is, is inclined to be in the form of afternoon showers, rather than in a sorios of blustery, rainv days.

In the normal course of events, some of these storms will happen to hit either on the day of the equinox or also sufficiently nearly so that them that have foith in the equinoctial storm tradition find ample justification for their belief. The stranger this belief the longer will be the time before or after the date of the equinox, that the believer will still attribute the storm to the influence of the efficial be-

ginning of fall.

Whether or not there is greater probability of sterm at this season, we do know that there has never been any demonstrated connection with the astronomical event which we call equinox",

There is still another Dike Marsh in this area. This, the Tracy Dike Tarsh, dates from 1762 and is now owned by Fletcher Wood of Chicken Mill, Gouldsboro. Kr. Wood has prepared the following, "Jenathan Tracy came to salmouth, now Portlani, in 1742-3 from Preston, Conn. The first of Aug. 1762 he loved to Gouldsboro, imuced by offers of three lots of land for himself and ore for each of his sons. Jonathan Tracy's place was at Gouldsboro Point where now in held the annual August Picaic of the numerous Tracy family. Mis son Asa sottlod on the adincent eastern lot on this property.

There was a large salt marsh of some 80 acres, that extended inland between Jonathan's and Asa's lands. At the mouth of this Marsh

there was a small island that extended about 2/3 of the way across, so the salt water tide flowed in on each side to flood the Morsh. The Tracys built a Dike across each channel with a gate in the Dike on the North side so they could regulate the water. On the South side they built the Dike wide enough for a toam of oxen to travel over with farm machinory to the little island which they clonred and used as farm land. It produced a fine quality of hay no into no the year 1915. The March land after being dikod was an excellent hay privilege. And the Tracys, both father and son, reaped a great benefit on it as both were large oattle rnisers".

SNOW CANNING - JOHN TARBOX

While we were wniting in John Inrbox's office at Snow! Canning Corporation, South Gouldaboro, we watched 21 sen gulls sitting on the ridge pole of the 100 ft. long building on the wharf. They were rentless and apparantly falt that the choice sents were at the bay and of! the roof for, as each one loft for a short flight, the noxt one edged along closing up the open space. Wa not only saw the gulls but a million dollar view. Tho tide was low; many fishing boats were at their moorings. Stave Island Harbor lay under ripples up to Stave Island to the right, to Yellow and Jordan Islands and on across Frenchman's Bay to Burnt and Long Porcupine Island whore the hazey blue mountain range of Mt. Desert Islaml towered like royality above .its subficts.

Sitting opposite us, as we writed for John Tarbox to return from luncheon, was Rona Daloy of South Goulds-boro, secretary since 1947. She was doing semething with eards that resembled playing

MOON RUNS HIGH, MOON RUNS LOW "Those expressions are frequently used in almanacs, but what do they mean?

Clanvos of Stouben and moved to Bar Earbor whore he carried on black amithing for a fow years. Thon he care back to Stouben Ruidge 2 yours ago". bought a home and died there

Seth Clonves who bought the Asr Tracy Farm farmed it for only two years thon

was offered a good position on a farm in West Ruidge, N.H. of which his uncle was managor. Soth hold the proporty till a few years ago and sold it to the present owner Fletcher Wood.

After the horse and buggy days were over and inothing around to est hay, there was no object in keeping up the dikes so they went to docny, and the tides flowed in on the old salt marsh as they did whon the Tracys settled on the lands in 1762.

I think this is a vory correct history of the Tracy inrsh and Dikos.

Ash Tracy died on his form at the age of 92 years. Soth Clonvos died at West

Snow of Pinc Point was to pack alowivos, clamo, mussols, and son harring in their respective scasons. (Son horring is a regular horring only thon the ruling was to pack in a round can with bring).

June of that year John and his family bought the Chan Noyes house on Beech Hill, West Gouldsboro where they still live. The new factory went into operation April 23 1943. We print below the ... telegram his uncle sent him.

"We all join in congratulating you and your employees for the splendid work you have done toward building a new canning factory. We appreciate your excellent judgement in starting your first canning operation on this builful good Friday

morning. With your capabilities and under your personal supervision we all feel confident that it will be a prespercus enterprise." Fred H. Snow.

As we finished reading the telegram John nedded, "We really did our first packing on Good Friday".

A line of havy personnel was bearing a huge hose, Rudy Johnson among them, putting out the last of random blazes. A red light appeared on the Landorth perch! It was the sun.

ECLIPSES

"When I was a boy I could hardly wait to get a look at the "Old Farmer's Almanack" when it was first put on sale, What was interesting to know was whether there would be an eclipse visible where I lived. Some years there might be two total ealipses of the moon, and perhaps a partial eclipse of the sun, and then again there would be those disappointing years when there would be no chance of sceing on eclipse at all. It seemed wonderful that man could orcdict in advance to the second whon future oclipses would occur.

It must have been a long slow process of careful observation before early inhabitants caught on to the sequehoe by which colipses folthe first place an colipse of the moon can only fall at the time of the full moon, when the sun and moon are exactly opposite ouch other. Further more there are two seasons nearly six months apart when colipsos are possible. These sonsons advance slightly each your so that in the course of 9 yours and 5 days they just ohongo places, and in 18 years and 10 days they return to their former positions. Consoquently, the same colipses repent every 18 years but ocour 10 days later. They are not always visible at the same place on the earth, but would be seen if the obseror moved himself a third way bround the world. In 54 years the observor would find himbolf buck whore he atarted. and sure enough he would see n reputition of the same oclipsos, just no n friend would who had nover left the spot. This ropotition in 54 years, 1 mon, and 1 day or so was recognized by primitive poople and cambled them to prodict such occurances as the total colipse of the moon that will take place on the night of Nov. 17-18." SNOW CANNING - JOHN TARBOX

After the sardine carrier MISHAWAKA blow up at a wharf in Southwest Harbor, John Tarbox, manager and treasurer, bought the PAUL FREDER-ICK on June 12, 1951 from Denbow Fisheries, Lubec. Robert Hall of Millbridge is her captain.

Rena Duane Daley of South Gouldsboro has been secretary since 1947 and has a desk with that million dollar view of Frenchman's Bay. The first secretary was Dorothy Bunker of South Gouldsboro who was followed by Elizabeth Williams (now Mrs. Lendell Reilly of West Gouldsboro) and Richard Shaw of Prospect Harbor.

After the equipment was changed to process sardines, the factory worked at that and that alone for 1951 and 1952. However, in 1953 and 154 ther not only processed sardines but purchased ground fish (these were "shacked" monning "in'ards" and heads removed), "filleted", skun and , after packing them in 50 lb. tins, iced and shipped them by truck to Pine Point. There they were in diabely made into Snow's

Fish Chowdor.

Monnwhile in 1943 elams around here had played out. John Tarbox then bought the already "shucked "clam from as far away as Addison, Cutler, some local and Sullivan and shipped these to Pine Foint for Snow's Clam Chowder.

1956 was a rod banner year at the South Gouldaboro plant. They handled one million pounds of round ground fish (hake, haddock and cod with heads and "interds") and shipped these to Pine Point. Capt. Allison Bishop of Gorea in the other Snow Canning beat the CAPRIE B. brought the bisecst amount which he got at Bass Erbor.

Whether colled herring or sardinos the fish are first sucked out of the holds of the boats tied at the end of the 100 ft. leng warf. They travel through the foot square wooden duct to an outdoor corner of the fectory where they go onto a flake, are salted and steamed 8 min. After they so through the drier they go onto a remrkable four purpose carrier which convoys filled flakes to the prokers, returns empty flakes, carrios out refuse and the tins prehed by women wearing white caps. The one eclipse of the moon visible from here in the year 1956 will occur the night of Nov. 17-18. 1957 holds little prospect of one because the eclipse that will come 6 mon. from now will be about ever when the moon rises. The only chance would be to go to Nova Scotia and pray for a clear extern herizon above which the moon would rise atill

-5- colipsed. If you want to see an oclipse before 1958 watch this one.

The very first darkening will begin at just 11 PM but it will not be perceptible until the edge of the moon onters the darkest part of the onrth's shadow at 3 min, past midnight. By 8 min. post 1 AM the meet will be completely within the inner shadow known as the imbra, passing the mid point of the sclipse at 1:48 Aid, At exactly 2:27 the moon will just begin to come out of the dark shadow. and a little over an hour later at 3:33 it will be entirely out of the fringe shadow, or penumbra, and the oclipse will be officially ever.

While the times above can be prodicted yours in advance to the second, the unpredictable thing is the color which the moon may appear to be if visiblo. Sometimes the moon may completely disappear, and at other times it may shine with a curious coppory glow. This dopends on the atmosphoric conditions in those parts of the world whore, during the oclipso, the sun is just rising or just notting. How the moon will look this time is anybody's guess. "

"For meny years there has been much discussion regarding the rotation poriod (or day) of Venus. UNUSUAL TIDES FOR 1957 Attention of our readurs has already boon called to the two causes for extraordinary tides. The first is that the sun and moon must be in line, as at now and full moon, in order that not at cross purposos. The second is that once a month the meen is considerably

closer to the earth than ordinorily, so that the pull of the moon is correspondingly greater. It hoppens that this coming January the time of greatest pull coincides closely with the full moon and the result is that we should expect unusually high and low tides about that timo.

In addition the full moon in January runs high in the sky, just opposite of the sun, and when the moon is either vory high or very low, in conitrast to taking a middle course, the morning and afternorn tidos tond to be equal. Thus the morning high still further increased in height, while the following ten out with a crinkled top) lower than it otherwise would bo. Consequently on that day thore will be both the record high and the record low for the year.

A similar coincidence betwoon maximum pull and the new moon will occur in August and ngain in Sopt., but since the moon will at that time be taking a middle course there will not be the additional strain they shall pull togother and to broak the record of January. 

South Gouldsboro 6 cups of sifted flour 1 tsp cardimonno soods (i.ooro's Drug Store and most necessary for the flavor of the cringle)

1 cup of butter or shorton-

1 cup sugar

4 1/2 tap baking powder

1 cup raisons

l cup citron

2 e gs

1 1/2 curs milk

Put the flour into a bowl out with the fingers as you would for a pie crist. Add the summr, cordimonne seeds, boking powder, reisons, citron cut fine, milk and the testen our. Save a little of the boston ope to brush the cringle. The dourh or bottor is worked out autokly and in rolled out into a long roll an a Jolly roll. (Will make 2 rolls.) Place onto a gronsod cooky shoet, Brush the rolls with the benton off. Sprinkle top with sugar and the chopped almonds. Bake at 350 for about 3/4 of an hour.

The following will show how Julia Stewart's oustomers feel about her big. golden brown, light, rover-feellike-coment-in-the-stomach donuts. One year she sold a great many to a small boy from New Jorsey. The next summor ho appeared at her door, looked at her, didn't speak and, turning back toward a car parked in the driveway, shouted, "She's here". Thon, more relaxed, he stopped into the kitchen snying, "I worried all the way up from New Jerser that you wouldn't be hore".

Julia Stewart's donut business began late in hor life after raising eight children. Still wanting to holp hor family sho kept a listening oar for opportunity. Then, one day a summer residont asked her if she would cook a few things for him. This was in 1946.

Since then she has worn outbusy. two Sunboam mixors, oach having mixed 10,000 dezen denutshold ingredients for 10 dez. As wo discussed mixors wo noticed senething unusual sitting noar contor in hor kitchon, On a clorified
