Sir

This afternoon Mr Philip Livingston of New York told me that one of our Delegates at Burlington desired him to tell me that Mr Franklin was carried no further than Hackensack & refused to go any further. I spoke to Mr Hancock after who gave me the enclosed letter to you & expressed great surpris that the Guard we sent with him had not proceeded throughtly to Gov. Trumbull. Possibly you may have already taken order in this matter of not I hope it will be done immediately.

The Congress this Day read your letter & ordered a Battalion to march to Monmouth. I have also decided that the militia of these Counties of Pensilvania intended for part of the flying Camp should rendezvous at Brunswick & thence march as proposed. I am Sir your most debt
