

Chesterville, Jan. 25. 1819.

Sir, I have recd. a circular Letter signed  
 by a number of Gentlemen appointed a committee  
 at Augusta of whom your name ~~is~~ <sup>occupies</sup> the first  
 place relative to the district of Maine becoming  
 an independent State, the following is the  
 result of my inquiries & consideration upon the  
 Subject which I communicate to you & through  
 you to the committee.

There is but little doubt, that a large majority  
 if not all in this Section of the District are  
 convinced that a Separation of Maine from  
 Massachusetts would advance the interests of  
 Maine, but there is as little doubt that a  
 majority will be found opposed to the measure  
 at present, although the cause of this opposition  
 is Obvious yet I for bear to mention it—  
 hence, perhaps the better way will be to postpone  
 bringing the question anew before the People, or  
 the Legislature, <sup>at least</sup> a year or two longer.  
 notwithstanding if the friends of the measure in  
 general should conclude otherwise, no doubt those  
 who are in favour of the measure in this section  
 of the district will co-operate.
