Dear Sir

I have consulted with the gentlemen named in your last favor and we are all of the opinion that want of time must preclude us from adopting the precise course you suggest on the subject of a new constitution. Permit me to suggest to you a course which I am inclined to think would not be liable to the objections which we think exist against the precise mode pointed out in your letter and at the same time embraces its essential features. —xxxxxx. If you were to write to the three gentlemen named, informing them of our new position of affairs. suggesting to them to take the existing constitution of Mass. as a basis, and point out what alterations, omissions and additions they from their long experience think would improve the instrument. you would pay them a more delicate compliment perhaps while their advice would come in a form better calculated to produce good effects.
