

Boston June 7 1819.

R. Williams Esq.

Dear Sir,

Your fav. of the 28<sup>th</sup> ult. was put into my hands this morning by M. Vose. The balance due from the State Treasurer to Capt. Gage I rec<sup>d</sup> for him last week, & by his request paid over \$200 to M<sup>r</sup> Dillingham, which I have understood from M<sup>r</sup> Winthrop he had rec<sup>d</sup> from M<sup>r</sup> D.— Since the rec<sup>d</sup> of your letter I have call<sup>d</sup> on M<sup>r</sup> D. who also says that he has paid over to M<sup>r</sup> Winthrop \$200 for you, which is all he has collected, that he expects \$100 to be paid to him this week, which he will hand to me as soon as rec<sup>d</sup>.— I sent you John Jones's plan of the 4<sup>th</sup> range in Sidney by M<sup>r</sup> Soule which he promised me to deliver you on his arrival at Augusta.— The receipt for the Direct tax of 1814 which you wished for has not yet been found, tho M<sup>r</sup> Winthrop and myself have made several searches therefor—and we have no better success in discovering any thing relation to a contract between the Ply. Co & Thomas Turner.

The great Question of a Division of the State, which is before a very respectable committee of the two houses, progressed very smoothly & auspiciously, till they came to the article of a division of the publick Property— One day has been spent in committee upon that
