My dear People

Yesterday was a big day for us, we received a mail, the first one this year, and in it for me three letters two from you of the 19th & 23 Dec, & one from Ed, and be assured I was very glad to hear from you once more, you cannot tell what a relief it is to get a letter here in the army, and how awful it is to be cut off from all the world & know nothing that is going on – but

I hope hereafter we shall get our mails regular^{ly} & hear from home a little oftener.

Well here we are in winter quarters at last, or in the woods, a good place to make winter quarters and hope to remain long enough to get rested & a good ready for the spring campaign altho I am fearful we shall not be left quiet very long as we have already been under orders to march but did not go. I think I wrote you from Clifton, well we left there on the 8th and came up here by boat arriving on the 10th had a wet cold time, but since then the weather has been splendid. The men have been busily at work building quarters each squad after their own taste and our camp looks like quite a little village. My squad have been building today all but two of our mess staid behind with the teams, and did not get up till yesterday so we have not got settled yet, but will get to housekeeping in a day or two, and if we are

let alone expect to enjoy ourselves a good ^{deal} in our new house. I am very glad to know you are flourishing so well & have got plenty of

hog & hominy, I hope your hog wont all be gone when I get home for I shant know how to live without hog, & hard tack, only seven months more, I went down to the mustering officer to be mustered in this afternoon, and find I cannot be mustered till I am promoted to P^rLt, they would not muster a P^r & 2nd Lt but will muster a Cap^t & P^rLt, I was a little disappointed for I was to be a Q.M. which would suit me much better than to go with the Co. again if I can get my commission within a month so I can muster while my time is over six months I can muster for the balance of the time, in that case I will, if not I wont, unless our Q.M. who is Brigade Q.M. gets relieved I shall get the Q.M. when I do muster, we have had four Q.M's within a month, the last one went out for forage the day before we left Clifton & strayed off from the teams & has not been seen since, & was undoubtedly killed, yesterday three of the fifths teams with fifteen men went out & were attacked & the teams & nine of the men captured, the country is swarming with small bands of bushwhackers, I am writing in the Adjs tent, he wants to shut up the desk to go to bed, so I must stop, as soon as I get into my house I shall have a chance to write as much as I please - Good night Remember me to all
