I went down to the mustering officer to be mustered in this afternoon, and find I cannot be mustered till I am promoted to <sup>pr</sup>Lt-they would not muster a pr & 2<sup>nd</sup> Lt but will muster a Cap & <sup>pt</sup>Le. I was a little disappointed for I was to be aQ.M. which would suit me much better than to go with the Co. again. If I can get my commission within a month so I can muster while my time is over six months I can muster for the balance of the time, in that case I will, if not I wont,-unless our QM who is Brigade QM gets relieved. I shall get the QM when I do muster, we have had four OM's within a month, the last one went our for forage the day before we left Cliffton & strayed off from the teams & has not been seen since & was undoubtedly killed. Yesterday three of the fifths teams with fifteen men went out & were attacked & the teams & nine of the men captured. The Country is swarming with small bands of bushwhackers. I am writing in the Adjs tent & he wants to shut up the desk to go to bed so I must stop. As soon as I get into my house I shall have a chance to write as much as I please – Good night Remember me to all---Yours Moses Direct to Eastport
