Dear Sir,

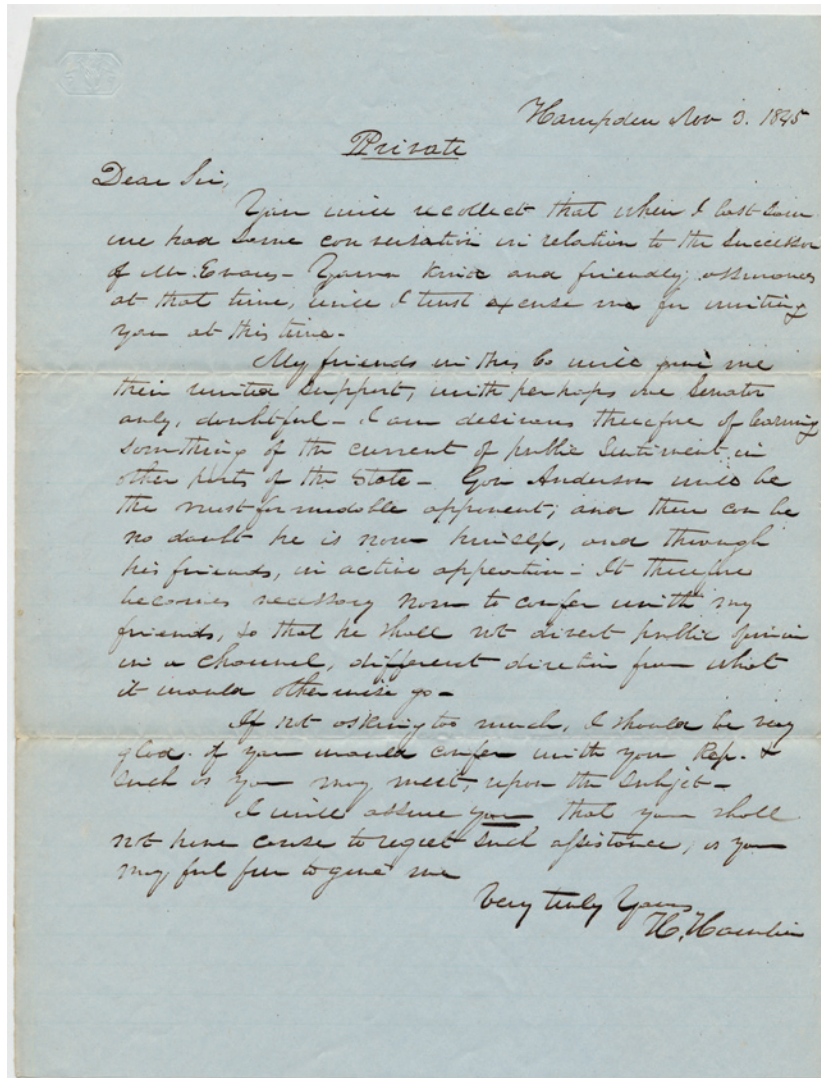
You will recollect that when I last saw we had some conversation in relation to the successor of Mr. Evans - Your kind and friendly assurances at that time, will I trust excuse me for writing you at this time-

My friends in this Co will give me their united support, with perhaps the Senator only, doubtful- I am desirous therefore of learning something of the current of public sentiment in other parts of the State - Gov Anderson will be the most formidable opponent; and there can be no doubt he is now himself, and through his friends, in active operation - It therefore becomes necessary now to confer with my friends, so that he shall not divert public opinion in a channel, different direction from what it would otherwise go -

If not asking too much, I should be very glad if you would confer with your Rep. & such as you may meet, upon the subject -

I will assure you, that you shall not have cause to regret such assistance, as you may feel free to give me
