As you have expressed an interest in filling up the bench of the Supreme court, after Judge Mellen shall have left it, I take the liberty to address a line to you upon that subject. It is known to me, that if Mr Shepley is appointed, he will not decline the office. I do not know of a gentleman, who would in my judgment, be more acceptable to the public, and I should regret extremely, if we should lose the opportunity to have the benefit of his services in that capacity. The Governor is fully possessed of his merits and pretensions, and is I think well inclined to present his name to the council.
