My Dear Brother,

The money, shoes, and your kind note reached me in safety, and every day since I have been intending to acknowledge the receipt, but Nancy has been very ill, of lung fever, which has added something to my daily routine of Domestic Avocations I am happy to say she is much better, and can sit up most of the time, though she has a bad cough, I have not heard from Daniel, since you were here, nor have I yet found any one to take my farm; and I now think I shall let out what little ploughed ground I have, my hay, or shares, and take care of my Dairy myself, as I cannot think of buying a team, and hiring a Man, I hope you will approve my plan, the snow here is still, very deep, Charles expect to leave the first of May, I think he is very tired of the, life of a Farmer, I shall hope to see you here, this month, if you can obtain it I should like you to bring me a dollar's worth of coffee crushed sugar, the rubbers fitted well, do give my love to your Wife and Children, and believe me as I ever am your truly affectionate
