My Dear Brother,

Your kind letter, with the other articles reached us duly, and in safty, most gladly would we have complied with your kind invitation, to spend this Festival, with you but the weather was so inclement, and the traveling so bad, that we did not think it prudent, to venture Yesterday, afternoon, and evening, furnished us with several inches of snow, but the wind has blown it in heaps, so that it will not I think, make ploughing, the weather also very cold, but we continue to keep ourselves, comfortable, having plenty of good wood, and the water not very far off, I have no animals, to attend to but my Biddies, and cats, having sold my pigs, and sent my cows, to spend the winter at Mr Boothby's but I fear the great snows, and long Winter, and shall gladly, and gratefully, avail myself, of yours, and your Wif's kind invitation to spend at least a part of the winter with you, and visit Ruth, and Anne, Elisabeth will remain till I leave, which, will probably be in two or three Weeks, when she will go to Limerick by the way of Gorham, and take our little girls, with her, we have all been suffering, from Influenza, but are now better, we have passed, our thanksgiving alone, but have not I hope been unremindful, of the many mercies bestowed on us, since our last Annual Festival, you must I know, on this day.
