

Portland March 8. 1835

Dear Bro.

Yours of the 4th & the documents came safe to hand. I thank you for both. The intelligence contained in your letter was quite surprising. If known how it would subject me to much suspicion. Cannot Child with other Augusta folks now be brought in? Wali of Waldo has already given me a letter, on the same sheet with Mason. Albert says Knowlton will soon give me one. Millor of the Senate will do the same. Just before the session closes Millor & you can get the Waldo Delegation without any noise. At any rate I have no doubt but you can. I enclose Clifford's letter. I supposed Ruggles had long ago sent me a letter to the Governor, if he has not he probably does not intend to do so. He has always made strong professions of kindness toward me & there his kindness has generally ended. Haynes is at work & is generally spoken of as my competitor. Is it possible the Augusta folks can go for him? If it will do I would certainly try the experiment of getting the Waldo Delegation. Toward C. I am as willing as he can be to let by-gones be by-gones - There would never have been any difficulty between us but for others who were eternally driving me up to oppose him. In future I am willing to have the past forgotten & he shall not find me among his enemies -
