Friend Pierce,

I have had a conversation with Mr. Bradbury, who said: he was not adverse your wishes - it was a new subject to him - a friend of his (I suppose J. Howard) would probably be a candidate &c. I told him I understood he would himself be a candidate (I had but a few moments before been told so) but he declared he was not, and authorized me to say so - He finally said he would do nothing against you and thought he would give you a letter - at any rate he would write you in a few days - I find your locution labours in the mind of some - the matter must be touched with skill in this quarter! By the way Bradbury I think, has a desire to get the appointment to look after the Pensioners in this State, if a law should pass in accordance with the recommendation in the President's Message. If you approve, suppose you drop him a line saying that I "had suggested to you that he would like it, if our friends approved", and that you would write to Smith and Shepley in his behalf. - He would I am confident, in reply send you a letter - To gain him is to gain a point here, as he might perhaps be put up to be a candidate by others mainly to divide and distract public attention.
