My dear Father, I am well and very anxious to hear from home I will give directions for writing with one page on a large sheet of paper enclose the whole sheet so I will have paper to answer on, then enclose in an envel ope with 10 cts silver to pay Confederate postage address Lt John P Sheahan Prisoner of War Columbia South Carolina Leave this unsealed, then enclose the in another envelope sealed and addressed Agent of Exchange Fortress Monroe (on one corner) For Prisoner of War, (with U.S. stamp on envelope) letters sent thus cannot fail to reach me I am enjoying the best of health and am in hopes to see you in a few months we hear rumors of exchange every day, I should like you to tell me all about Henry and Ned and all the folks at home time passes very rapidly since I have plenty of books to read
