Description: Letter of Charles A. Garcelon to his Uncle William H. Waldron regarding whether he should seek promotion or remain in his current post.

the officers of the regt are quite provoked at him,

Lieut. Mabbon advises me to retain my present position, we have the largest regt. in the Div. and but two officers detailed. You remember the Col. advised me to retain this position in preference to returning to the regt. for he thought I should not be able to stand the marching and fatigue. I had much rather retain this position than to receive any promotion. To muster in for three years from the date of promotion I cant see. I think that taking every thing into consideration

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it would be much better to retain my position here consequently it would be much better to have the commission issued right in the first place.

Our regt. is quite large between seven and eight hundred. The last lot of conscripts three hundred were first rate fellows we have received since Gettysburg over four hundred these with the returned prisoners, if they ever do return, will make a large regt. for some time to come. Col. Tilden is in Castle Thunder. Frank G. is at Annapolis but he is very weak I understand

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It is doubtful whether
John Brown ever return-
ed from Richmond
as he is very weak from
want of food

I understand that
there was a squad
of prisoners forward-
ed from Annapolis.
