minister at Brunswick, Maine.

Sr. Your known Zeal to do good & serve the Interest of Re: :ligion where you come, as it recommends you to all that are acquainted with it, so it has invited us to address our Selves to you at this time & to make a proposall, which, if accepted, we hope will put into your hands an opportu :nity of being instrumentall to the great good not of a particular Congregation only but the whole Land. Wherefore we would inform you, that having a considera :ble Interest in the eastern parts province of Maine, we are carrying forward Settlementt there & having enterd into engagements with the province to build a Fort there, have lately finish't it beyond all expectation, which is owing not, no much to our Industrious application (tho that was not wanting,) as to the remarkable Smiles of Providence on the undertaking too long here to relate, & which gives us hopes of future success. It is a fine strong stone Fort well built with lime, mounted with Ten peices of Canon & garrison'd with a Capt & fifteen men. But we desire to be fortified likewise with the Gospell, for promoting Religion, not only among the Garrison & the Inhabitants which we expect will in a good number resort thither in the Spring, but also the Indians, who are almost daily there. It is necessary that the Person engaging in this work should be full of self denyall, Zeal for Religion & Compassion to ignorant & perishing Idolaters, & one who will be content to forgoe many present enjoyments & endure some hardships & hazards for the Satisfaction of doing good here & the prospect of a Future Reward. For such a Man we have apply'd our Selves to the Comis: :sioners of the Indian Corporation & to severall of the Ministers of this Town, whose Generall Return is that there is no fitter person, nor more likely to answer that in: :tention than You, if your circumstances will permit you & your Inclinations dispose you to engage in it. We have not been wanting to provide as much encouragement as could be well expected from a few private persons,
