

Fort George (Penobscot) 15<sup>th</sup> March 1781.

Sir

I had the Honor of writing a Letter to your Excellency dated 24<sup>th</sup> August last a Duplicate of which is sent inclosed, and flatter myself with the justice every Officer may reasonably expect from your Excellency as Commander in Chief

I lately received a Letter from the Duke of Argyle informing me that Captain Alexander Campbell of the 74<sup>th</sup> Regiment, was as much recovered, as to be fit for any duty, and wished him to be continued in the Regiment, if his company was not disposed of, and that he had written to your Excellency to that Purpose. If this is Agreeable to your Excellency it has my Approbation.

The 17<sup>th</sup> of last Month a Party from this place Commanded by Lieut. Stockton of the King's Rangers, landed near to George's River Marched five Miles through the Woods to Thomas town, and about one in the Morning attack- ed the House where the Rebel Brigadier General Wadsworth (who Commanded all the Eastward

of Cape Ann) was Quartered with a guard of six Men, and took him and two of his men Prisoners and carried them to this place where he still Remains.

We had three Men wounded, one since dead. Brigadier Wadsworth intended to have gone for Falmouth the next day to take charge of the Fortifications of that place, which the Rebels are carrying on with all dispatch. I am informed they have already Twenty four Cannon mounted, of which some of them are 32 Pounders. Wadsworth says, they are to make very strong Works there, as they were informed it is to be Attacked by some British Troops next Summer, and they will be well Prepared to receive them.

As Lieut. Cheap who was appointed a Lieut. in the 74<sup>th</sup> Regiment never joined us, and my being informed (tho not officially) that he is gone into the East India Company's Service, I beg leave to recommend to your Excellency, John Campbell the Oldest Ensign to the Lieutenancy, and John Russel to be Ensigns, both deserving Men.

I am sorry to inform your Excellency,

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that the inhabitants of this Country have no Attachment to the King. Altho' they have taken the Oath of Allegiance, and from the long stay of the 74<sup>th</sup> Regiment in this place the Inhabitants, have got acquainted with the Soldiers and have enticed some of them to desert, therefore humbly requests your Excellency will be pleased to relieve the Regiment from this Place, how soon convenient.
