Description: Horatio Jose wrote to George F. Shepley regarding the loss of regimental paperwork and receipts that had been burned by confederates as well as events in Portland.

Portland Jany 20th/65 My Dear General, I enclose letter in reply to yours' in regard to ordnance stores, I have no recollection of ever receiving any Invoice or of giving any receipts for the guns. They were sent to us just before leaving Portland - from Major Strong. The receipts were all lost by Webb – I can get a certificate from him if it will do any good, that the Invoices & vouchers were all destroyed by the enemy at Bayou Beraf

how not the papers wanted by you - any thing I ear do in this matter I will - Webl is in Bost Tick & I fear never will be any better, I have written him in roy willto it, let me know of there is any thing men that I fan do to help you out in this matter, vin his failer at Frest that he will come out all right get, pray

I am very sorry that I have not the papers wanted by you – any thing I can do in this matter I will – Webb is in Boston sick & I fear never will be any better. I have written him, in regard to it, let me know if there is any thing more that I can do to help you out in this matter.

I have felt really very sorry for Genl Butler [?] his failure at Fort Fisher – I feel in hopes that he will come out all right yet, pray tell me how it all happened when you have time —

I hope you well exeun me for not writing you before aleant matters how, mad with lectures after he bushed out of his offen to sile out that I had no patien with him, il think it weller a long dy befor he gets the contrany I take him he must fry two hundred dollars rent for the harant land - which he has paint

I hope you will excuse me for not writing you before about matters here.

I felt so devlish mad with [?] after he backed out of his offer to sell out that I had no patience with him. I think it will be a long day before he gets any more discounts - on the contrary I told him he must pay two hundred dollars rent to the vacant land which he has paid since Oct 1st/64 –

Give my love to nellie – tell her I should like to take her out in the skating park & to sleigh ride – we are all well – will write you again soon – Yrs as ever H N Jose [Written sideways on left] P.S. let me hear from you when you have a spare
