Date: September 29, 1862

Description: Pvt. John Sheahan of Co. K of the 1st Maine Cavalry wrote to his parents in Dennysville about a month after his enlistment.

For the Union Maine C. Magnus 12 Frankfort St N.Y. Washington Sep 29/62 My Dear father and Mother I have just received your letter and I was very glad to hear from you the money just come in time for I was all out and it is a good thing to have some money in case of sickness but there is no fear of my being sick I weigh 156 pounds, and am in good spirits the weather is fine and as the boys say everything

hangs, high. The have made a slight move an have left The barracks and gone into tents about a half mile from the city and I am glad of it for the barracks were full of lice we are having good Times here now we only drill about 3 hours a day and the rest we loaf how lang it will be this way I cannot tell I have been to see the boys in the 18 twice all that 9 Enlisted wish they were in the caralry with me Cape was tickled to see me when I went up first they don't like

is jovial and the goose hangs high.

We have made a slight move we have left the barracks and gone into tents about a half mile from the city and I am glad of it for the barracks were full of lice we are having good times here now we only drill about 3 hours a day and the rest we loaf how long it will be this way I cannot tell I have been to see the boys in the 18th twice all that I enlisted wish they were in the cavalry with me Cape was tickled to see me when I went up first they dont like

to lug the knapsack, we are Encourped in a wal nut grove it is a splendid place for a camp if we stay here long the muto will be whe and then we shall have large times, when did you hear from Bill where is he I shall write to him tomorrow I would go see him but I do not know where he is 9 got a long letter from Mils Hill, she is going to Send me a paper every day week she clases by saying now John if there is anything you want any time let me know it and I will send it O she is a friend

to lug the knapsack. we are encamped in a walnut grove it is a splendid place for a camp if we stay here long the nuts will be ripe and then we shall have large times. when did you hear from Bill where is he I shall write to him tomorrow I would go see him but I do not know where he is. I got a long letter from Miss Hill, she is going to send me a paper every day week she closes by saying now John if there is anything you want any time let me know it and I will send it O she is a friend

worth having a dear, me three papers already it is supportine and I must close for a while since I wrote the above I have had supper and breakfast, I sought Six cents works of sausage last night and this morning I had it fried for breakfast weather here now as we have in july at home The paper high Hill sends me and I want them kept good, this pen is horrid por don't give up the 100 dollars bounty for the man that gave it to me said he would run The risk of Dennys vill claiming me of dont give it you of they write to your
