

I received your letter of the 19th
yesterday.

Catletts Station Va
July 27. 1863

My Dear Father now that I
again have a chance to write you
I will do so since we expect
to move and I do not know
when or where I shall have
another opportunity we are
again near the Rappahannock
and have met with no enemy
since we crossed the Potomac
except at Halltown and Shepherds
town at the latter place we
had one of the hardest fights
that the Cavalry has ever been
in I was in the hottest of
the fight all the afternoon
but never received a scratch

The one quarter of our regiment
was lost in the fight. Our
regiment - tho dwindled to a
mere nothing still continues
to be paraded to the highest
and it deserves all that can
be said it - for it has done
the most fighting and done it
in a better manner than any
other regiment - in the service,
I have seen some of our
fights pictured in Harpers Pictorial
I wish you could have seen
them you would get some
idea of how Cavalry fights.
It is far more dispersed than
Infantry fighting but - does not
last so long, I think and
in fact - I know that - our
fighting has reached its end
for we had but little.

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fighting to do while we
were on the Rappahannock
hoping to hear from you
soon I will close
